

### Editorial: To serve is to learn

### How editing a newsletter helped me stay sober

I can still remember, four years ago, when I was asked to serve as editor of *Our Primary Purpose*. Right away, I could think of all the reasons why I couldn't, or why I didn't have the time, or that I wasn't sober long enough.

Just like the notion of quitting drinking, and admitting we are powerless over alcohol, it's always easy to make a case for not taking action today. Let's wait until tomorrow. But then tomorrow never comes.

Now, after 48 issues of the newsletter – 24 as editor and 24 as writer/editorialist – it's my privilege to reflect upon this experience; how it has helped to keep me sober and inspired me to become a better version of myself. If there's one thing I've discovered, more than anything else, it's how blessed we are to have a program like Alcoholics Anonymous to join and to serve.

#### A witness to history

Overnight, in March 2020, our world changed. Offices, stores and restaurants were suddenly off limits. Doors were shuttered to the church basements and community centers where we typically gathered for our meetings. We started discussing the war effort required to save each other from infection, hospitalization, or death. Words like "zoom" took on new meaning as we learned of the pandemic and COVID-19. AA responded with incredible deftness, as our fellowship pivoted from in-person to virtual meetings. Our local Intergroup website immediately informed members about the status of their daily or weekly home groups. And many of us, who were no more than casual computer users, had to all of a sudden take a crash course in how to navigate the ID numbers, and passwords required to access an online forum.

But we DID it, quickly showing how resilient we were! We proved to ourselves that staying sober was still our number one priority, even if we had to make extra efforts to acquire new skills.

#### The silver lining

More than anything, we began to realize, in the comfort of our living rooms and pajamas, how fortunate we were to have this ongoing human connection to each other. While close friends and loved ones were feeling isolated, and cut off from their normal lives, we were still able to share our experience, strength and hope with fellow AAs. As days turned into weeks, and weeks into months, our gratitude deepened. We saw the still suffering alcoholic, who hadn't even attended a face-to-face meeting, put down the drink. We witnessed them finding and working with sponsors they had never met in person. We saw our program of AA reaching the infirmed and others who had never had the chance to get sober.

As newsletter editor, I had a front row seat to perhaps the biggest and most profound transition our program had ever witnessed. The "Traditions" were taking on new meaning right before our eyes. I had the opportunity to interview AAs who were attending meetings all over the world. I spoke to people who had moved to other continents and who were now able to have reunions with their old home groups online, back in Ottawa.

#### Serving is learning

I will always remember how happy people were to set aside time and let me ask questions about how they got and stayed sober. Over and over again, you told me about learning to love yourself, and that if you really wanted something you had to "give it away."

You, the readers of this newsletter and members of Ottawa Area Intergroup, taught me that if I wanted to stay sober, I needed to help others find sobriety...I needed to give my sobriety away. I have served, and I have learned. And I love you all for having given me this space and these words to share.

#### From the AA Archives....

History of the Ottawa Alkathon Founded: Late 1960's

The Alkathon was started by two members (Toby Craig and Jack W) during the late '60s. At the time, they invited the destitute and homeless alcoholics to a Christmas Dinner held on Christmas Eve at St. Giles Church, corner of Bank St. & First Ave. It was an unparalleled gesture to serve a first-class dinner to the street people of Ottawa afflicted with Alcoholism. It was a two-hour affair followed by an A.A. meeting. Some of these hardened street people didn't show, as they did not want to pay the price - attending an A.A. meeting. It was nonetheless successful and repeated the following year with an increased attendance. This Christmas Dinner on Christmas Eve had grown and grown to what has become known as the Alkathon today.



After that it went to a stand-alone Committee comprised of members from local Groups with the focus being placed on AA meetings and fellowship; the food was secondary. New Years Eve was also now included. This lasted for a few years; however, the Alkathon Committees started having the event catered which was quite expensive.

In the late 1980's, early 1990's, the Alternate District Committee Members (Alt/DCM's) from Districts 48, 54, 58, 62 & 66 became responsible for the Alkathon Committee due to the fact that they have committee experience. The Alt/DCM's brought information back to their District's regarding the happenings of the Alkathon Committee and how it was coming along. Contributions came from Districts and Groups and any surpluses were disbursed back to Districts.

For quite a number of years now, the Alkathon has returned to a stand-alone committee and has been that way ever since. Traditionally, Districts 54, 58 and 62 (Districts 48 and 66 now have their own event) and Intergroup in Ottawa provide "seed money" to get the Alkathon off the ground. Again, traditionally, the Alkathon Committee would return the seed money and any surpluses back to the Districts and Intergroup if it was available. More times than not, the Ottawa Fellowship has been extremely good to its Alkathon and the seed money, plus surplus, has been returned. Liaisons from each of the three Districts are asked to attend Alkathon Committee meetings to bring the information back to their Districts. Many of these Liaisons also become active members on the Alkathon Committee helping out where needed!

In 2014, the Alkathon held a group inventory which was facilitated by a District Committee Member (DCM) to take a look at how they were doing and if they were adequately serving the fellowship and carrying the AA message. Out of that inventory, it was realized that the focus needed to be placed back on the AA meetings and fellowship; the food was secondary. A mission statement was then developed which reads: "The Basic purpose of the Alkathon is to provide a safe and sober environment for the new and still suffering alcoholic over Christmas and New Year."

In 2018, the Alkathon held another group inventory which was facilitated by another DCM. A few weeks later the Alkathon Committee met with the Chair and Vice-Chair of Intergroup and there was a proposal to take the Alkathon under the umbrella of Intergroup. The joint meeting was quite lengthy and there was ample discussion and a vote was taken whether to remain a stand-alone committee or not. Results were twenty in favour for remaining as a stand-alone committee, with 1 abstention.

The 2019 – 2020 Alkathon was one like no other. It was quite unique and one for the history books for sure! In December 2018, the first case of COVID-19, also known as the coronavirus pandemic, was recognized in China. By March of 2019, the world had basically shut down due to the spread of this disease.

The 2019 - 2020 Alkathon was held virtually on Zoom as we were in the midst of the Covid-19 Virus Pandemic. Both December 24th and December 31st had the days starting at 2:00 pm with different Groups putting on meetings. From 8 – 9 pm, Speaker meetings were held. The days wrapped up with Fellowship being held from 10:30 – 11 pm. Both days saw good attendance, with the Speaker meetings being very well attended.

In December 2021, the pandemic was still happening, albeit not quite as restrictive. Indoor attendance was now allowed, but only up to 25 people. A virtual Alkathon did not take place for 2021 – 2022.

This is Ottawa's Alkathon and the fellowship takes good care of it. The main goal of the Alkathon has always been for the alcoholic who is suffering. This is not always the new comer. Christmas and New Years can be a very difficult time of year for many and the Alkathon provides hope, love and acceptance to all.

Share your pain.


Let go of old ideas.
