A New Year—a time for New Beginnings

Step 1 We admitted we were powerless over alcohol—that our lives had become unmanageable.

Tradition 1 Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

What is a 12-Step Call?

A 12 Step Call is when AA members make an in– person visit or zoom or phone call with an alcoholic, many times a desperate drunk. The 12 Step call volunteer asks the alcoholic a very important question: Would you like to have an AA member(s) come to see you or speak to you on the phone, and talk to you

about the program of Alcoholics Anonymous and how the AA program could help you to stop drinking?

Desperate Alcoholic Traits:

- * bloodshot eyes
- * hands shaking so violently, they cannot hold a bottle of booze
 - * throwing up

* drinking their last bottle of Listerine, cough syrup of traditional booze, a bottle of Jack Daniels, or in some cases, multiple bottles of B&G Cuvee Speciale Rouge

* not able to attempt to go on an in-person AA Closed or Open meeting because of their physical unwellness



The 12-Step in-person calls are not for every AA member. It is for the AA member who believes in the picture "Man on the Bed" (Alcoholic #3 Bill Dotson). Being available to call the alcoholic up and say: two of us alcoholics would like to come over to meet with you tonight? What would be a good time for you?

The 12-Step Call

We introduce ourselves as Alcoholics. We allow the Alcoholic the opportunity to share their situation. We share with the Alcoholic, our story, and how we reached Alcoholics Anonymous, and how we work the AA program one day at a time. We do this to achieve another day without picking up the first drink. We then ask our new friend, if that new friend has a willingness to stop drinking. If the answer is 'Yes', we hand them a copy of the Big Book with an AA handshake. We give our contact information, and ask the Alcoholic to read the first 164 pages. If they have any questions, we ask them to give us a call or call the Telephone Answering Service hotline. We leave them with a copy of the Meeting Directory, outlining meetings in their immediate area that they may want to attend and GSO approved information. Let us remember, every time two AA members successfully complete a 12-Step in-person visit, zoom or phone call, the Alcoholic has an opportunity to understand the meaning of the word "hope" to stop drinking. And the two alcoholics working the 12-Step Call are able to carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic.

My Friendship with Alcohol

My friendship with alcohol started on my 16th birthday. I'll never forget the feeling, the exhilaration; there was an immediate attraction. The early days were more of a friendship as we didn't see each other every day. However, as time passed, I started to appreciate how good of a friend alcohol was becoming. If I was feeling shy, then it would help bring me out of my shell. If I was wanting to really celebrate, then I had a partner who was more than willing to aid in amplifying the experi-

ence. The relationship was held on a controllable dull roar throughout my high school years.

I joined the military immediately following graduation; it was honestly easy to keep my relationship with alcohol in high regard throughout the next 27+ years while serving. There were occasions almost every week where I could continue to build the relationship. TGIFs, retirements, promotions, "sports days" were just some of the events where my companion and I could spend time together. I lost my license twice and was

put on administrative warnings, yet I continued to progress to a very high rank. I had become wed to alcohol.

As part of the administrative action put on me after the 2nd offence, I was forced to seek counselling. This led to my voluntary participation in a treatment center program. This was the first time where I started to take stock of what my relationship with alcohol was costing. However, like all of my other studies throughout my academic career, I felt that if I completed it with diligence, then I could consider myself cured - course complete, finished. My eyes had been opened to the impacts, yet I wasn't ready to make any changes. I tried a separation from the relationship, but it didn't last long. It's like I needed to hire someone to help me make a break.

Part of my recovery plan included participating in AA. I didn't go in the beginning because I figured I could again take what I had learned and figure it out on my own. I wanted a separation (from alcohol) agreement, but wasn't ready to pay for a "lawyer" to make it binding. I would go a few months in a temporary state of separation, but it never lasted. I kept relapsing; it was time to ask for

> other professional help so I hired a different sort of lawyer. I started to invest, but not monetarily.

been opened to the impacts, yet I wasn't ready to make any changes.

My eyes had

My payments began when I started to attend regular AA meetings and I really started to invest when I commenced working the entirety of the program. 1 desperately wanted a divorce, so, similar to what it would cost in a legal sense for a lawyer to take this action, I started to increase my payments to the program. The more I paid (worked), the more I was able to keep the separation in place. It's when I really started to pay for a great lawyer (truly invest in all aspects of the program)

that I've been able to stay sober for 6 months. Sometimes the rates are higher, but the investment is always worth it. The sanity, clarity and beauty of life are the rewards. I offset the price of alcohol to ensure I continue to pay my AA lawyer. The cost of sobriety is truly priceless.

From the AA Archives: Crossroads Group

Founded: January 1970

Founding members Ambrose H., Eddie H., Dillon H., Frank K., Bob K., Jack L. and Ernie O. started the Group in January 1970. Six of the founders were members of the Triangle Group and the 7th did not have a home group. All lived in Ottawa's West End and wanted to start up a meeting that would be located closer to home.

Over the years, Crossroads has spawned several spin-off Groups – Kanata (Monday), Parkwood Hills,

Queensway-Carleton and Share & Care.

Crossroads used to be an open speaker format. In 2018, it changed to a



closed discussion meeting with an open speaker meeting being held the last Monday of the month. The readings used are the "Serenity Prayer, How it Works, The Steps and The Traditions, and The Lord's Prayer. Initially there were 8 members at the first meeting and within two years, attendance had grown to 80-90. That has since dropped to approx. 20 with 10 members. Most are over 40 years of age with a mixture of 80% male 20% female.
